Amateurs stole the spotlight in the opening round of the 10th Florida Open golf tournament at Miami Shores Thursday. The top performer was Henry Russell, current Riviera Country Club champion, who fired a 33-37-70, two under par, to lead by a single stroke.

Only seven golfers shot par or better, and in addition to Russell this select group included four other amateurs. They shunned pressure and the drizzling rain to stick in the thick of the scramble.

Hard on Russell's heels with 71s were amateurs Bill Leigh, 18, Lakeland with 36-35-71 and Bev C. Nabers, 40-year-old St. Petersburg golfer and 1939 Louisiana State champion. He scored 34-37-71.

Sharing the second spot with the "Simon Pures" was Joe Lopez, Sr., Key West. Joe was the only pro to dent par, and his initial performance inspired 19th hole comment that he is the man to beat.

Broyles Plemmons, Gainesville, and two local amateurs were only two strokes in arrears with their 72s.

Plemmons scored 35-37-72. Earl Clark, Miami Shores star, matched that score with a pair of 36s, while Bill Stembler of the Miami Country Club came through with a 33-37-72.

Lt. Dick Montney, Army Air Forces officer from MacDill Field, and Bonny Graham, Sarasota pro, finished with 73s.

The tourney attracted 173 paid entrants.
